

THINGS ABOUT NEWQUAY

The Cribbar is a reef off the Towan Headland in Newquay, best known for creating huge waves (some in excess of 30ft!) that only occur a handful of times a year with the right swell and weather conditions. The Cribbar was unsurfed until Chris Bertish surfed it in 2004 and is now popular with experienced big wave surfers from across the world!

The Headland Hotel, which stands on the North side of Fistral Beach in Newquay, is the proud film location of the 1990 film adaptation of Roald Dahl's 'The Witches.' Large parts of the movie were filmed at the hotel and the cast was in residence for quite some time, including stars Rowan Atkinson and Angelica Houston. Thousands of guests from all around the world visit The Headland having seen the film, and many wide-eyed children still look around for the mice!

Newquay began its life as a tiny fishing village named 'Towan Blystra'. In Cornish, Towan translates to 'hill' or 'dune', and Blystra means 'blown'. It is thought the town's harbour was badly damaged by severe weather, so in 1439 the locals applied to the Bishop of Exeter for funding to build a new quay. And so, a new quay was built, from which the town derives its current name – Newquay!

Newquay Airport has one of the longest runways in the UK at a staggering 2,744m! It's so long that the runway has even been used to test the Bloodhound World Land Speed record. The runway is also able to take the largest and fastest of civil and military aircraft, having been built and maintained for decades as an RAF base.

In September 1967, the Beatles came to Newquay to film parts of their "Magical Mystery Tour!" John, Paul, George and Ringo stayed at the Atlantic Hotel and ventured to Porth, Holywell and Watergate Bay to film the beaches. A plaque was erected in 2002 on the Killacourt to commemorate their visit. The Fab Four's stay in Newquay was brief, but the impact they had still lives on!

BEST FOR EXPLORATION

THE GANNEL ESTUARY

The River Gannel has its own little ecosystem with a broad flowing river, tidal estuary and the expansive Crantock Beach all in one beautifully scenic area. With many circular walks able to take you round the estuary and neighbouring countryside, you can amble back to Newquay Town Centre within the hour. Not only providing stunning views for walking and activities, it also allows dogs all year round.



BEST FOR FAMILIES

PORTH BEACH

A sandy and sheltered beach, Porth is protected by headlands on both sides making it a super sunbathing spot. Sit back and relax on your sun lounger with a good book and leave all your troubles behind you...just don't forget the sunscreen!





BEST FOR PEACE

LITTLE FISTRAL

Not surprisingly this is Fistral Beaches' little hidden companion. It's only around a small peninsula from the much bigger iconic Fistral beach, but is a great little find as few venture to discover it.



BODYBOARDING

There are many different water sport activities to get involved with whilst visiting Newquay, but for those with limited experience, bodyboarding is a brilliant starting point. There are plenty of places to pick up a board and head out into the waves, but if you're looking for some instruction, there are schools in the town that can help you learn the ropes.





EXPLORE ROCK POOLS

Newquay's beaches offer some great rock pooling spots, especially at Mawgan Porth, Whipsiderry Beach and Tolcarne. All you'll need is a bucket and an inquisitive mind, and start looking through all the little pools and crevices between rocks and cliffs. Just remember to release anything you find back into their natural environment.



SAND SCULPTURES

A fun, family activity, challenge the whole gang to make the best sand sculpture they can. Use the sand close to the waterline so it's already quite solid and then start making your shapes! Easy sculptures for beginners include crabs and turtles; use the side of spades to create lines and details...much more interesting than your usual sandcastles!

TEDDY BEAR'S PICNIC

With so many places to pick up delicious snacks in Newquay, including traditional English fish and chips and Cornish pasties, pack your children's favourite teddy bears and head down to the beach to relax and enjoy the idyllic views.

RESPECT THE WATER

Safe to swim, bodyboard & use inflatables between these flags.

TOP TIPS FOR STAYING SEASIDE SAFE:

- · Never swim if you're feeling tired or unwell.
- Make sure you don't swim alone and stay aware of the whereabouts of your party.
- If you see someone in trouble, phone 999 and ask for the Coastguard.
- If you get into difficulty in the water, float on your back with your arms underwater and breathe steadily.
 Try not to exhaust yourself and signal for help if you can.
- Wear sunscreen and reapply it every two hours, or after each trip into the water.



The beating heart of the town for generations, the harbour is where the name Newquay originates. We raise some secrets from it's depths as well as reveal some exciting things to do in this area...

ewquay was first mentioned in the early 15th century as "a keye" a small fishing hamlet on the edge of the manor of Towan Blystra. The apparent damage to the existing quay in 1439 led to a request for assistance from Edmund Lacy, Bishop of Exeter. An indulgence was granted to all those who contributed to the rebuilding work by way of labour, materials or money.

Newquay was further mentioned by Richard Carew in his Survey of Cornwall of 1603 as "newe Kaye" a place only suited for fishing. During the early 19th century the growing village of New Quay was joined to the village of Towan by Fore Street







to become the small town of Newquay as renamed by the Chamber of Commerce in 1882. This period saw the gradual evolution of the town from fishing and a coastal marine harbour town to a growing tourist destination.

With the coming of the passenger railway to Newquay in 1876 and the subsequent increase in tourism during the 20th century, the traditional harbour based industries declined. However recent developments has seen Newquay harbour develop to support the tourist trade with charter boats providing deep sea fishing for anglers and fishing boats supplying fish and shell fish to local restaurants.

Sea Safari is a must when visiting Newquay. Boats sail out from the harbour every day, exploring the north coast, discovering hidden coves spotting seals and even dolphins and sharks!

WIND IN THE SAII

For all things boating, the harbour is THE place to be! Many sailing boats head out to sea each day between May and September giving you a fascinating perspective of Newquay and its surroundings.



ISN'T JUST FOR

If you're wondering when the best season is to take your holiday to Newquay, the answer is whatever the season!

he coastal path follows the cliffs which border most of our beaches so in many cases you can choose to either walk the paths or on the beach. When walking on the beaches special care must be taken to know your tide times. Most of Newquay's beaches have steps or roadways down to them but some sections in between the main beaches can be cut off by the tide - even when it is only part way in.

The coastal path follows the cliffs and walking north of Newquay you can walk virtually uninterrupted to Padstow and beyond, passing through typical Cornish villages on your way. The coastal road between Newquay and Padstow follows the coast path fairly closely so it is a popular option to use the bus service as a way of returning or vice-versa.

DOGGY DAYS

ooking for the pawfect holiday for you and your doggy best friend? With plenty to explore in Newquay you won't have to holiday without your furry friend ever again!

Dogs are allowed to play on nearly all of Newquay's glorious beaches all year round. Take a stroll down the Gannel whilst the dogs have a splash around in the shallows of the river Estuary. Or for those four legged surfer dogs, hit the waves down on the surfers favourite Fistral beach.

After a fun packed day at the beach your tired pup will need somewhere luxurious to take a nap.


Discover Cornwall and visit some of it's amazing attractions and countryside walks with your four legged companions.

TRENANCE Ottages

erving up a slice of Old Newquay is Trenance Cottages, a trio of beautifully renovated, Grade Il listed, Cornish cottages that are open to the public and free to enter – the only such row of pre-railway age dwellings found in Cornwall!

Situated in the heart of the tranquil and award-winning Trenance Gardens, Trenance Cottages have been lovingly preserved, protected, and improved by a group of volunteers who have saved a piece of history to create a special visitor experience. Just a short walk from the River Gannel and the Rose Gardens, this quaint trio of cottages offer a detailed insight into Newquay's heritage.

Built on the site of an old malthouse, the dwellings now



offer a unique attraction where visitors can learn, relax, and unwind in an iconic setting away from the hustle and bustle of the beaches and town centre. Or even get married!

Exploring the homesteads of Vine, Middle and Rose Cottage, one is invited to step back in time to experience the way Cornish ancestors once lived. From the life of a lifeboat coxswain who would have climbed a steep hill

before heading to sea, to the elderly spinster who fell through the ceiling in her bed one day, the museum contains a splendid collection of artefacts and information about the lives of past inhabitants. The museum explores their family heritage and includes reference to the life of an evacuee who enjoyed six years in a garden paradise far from the London Blitz which threatened her home.

Careful thought has been given to the furnishings to give the cottages a 1920s and earlier feel. Two of the heritage rooms still have the original cooking ranges in situ. Upstairs there is a charming bedroom that shows off splendid brass bed-knobs which were popularly big enough to enclose messages of love between romantic partners! And the newly created Children's Bedroom is set up as a replica



of the bedroom that was once occupied by London evacuee, Mavis Fernee for six years between 1941 and 1947. The like the one Mavis's father gave her, a doll in blue knitted outfit, an alphabet book and even a child's gas mask like the one she arrived with on the train. Centrepiece is an authentic 1944 Triang dolls house, which was lovingly restored by the Charity, Trenance Cottages Newquay, who own and manage the site. on the wall and, quite a surprise as one enters the room, there is a short piece of audio in which Mavis describes her magical life, playing in the gardens and even

elegant child, I was something of a tomboy". Fortunately, she does not repeat any of the 'colourful language' she brought down from the big city!

The museum gives visitors an opportunity to listen to other recordings from Newquay residents as well, all of whom recall their life and events, some from more than 100 years ago when the town was little more than a fishing village. Visitors can also view artefacts from the 1900s, learn about the buildings' history, and play a beautifully restored pianola! All of this whilst reminiscing about the development of tourism in the town and celebrating the ongoing work of the charity and its army of magnificent

volunteers who keep the cottages alive, all year round.

Before you leave, you may also wish to visit the gift shop to purchase a souvenir or stop at 'The Garden' tearoom to devour a Cornish cream tea – a great way to recharge before exploring the rest of the Trenance valley!

LEARN, RELAX AND UNWIND IN AN ICONIC SETTING



TREEWalk

renance Valley, set in 26 acres of lush, sub-tropical planting, is often referred to as the jewel in Newquay's crown. The sub-tropical valley is home to some extremely unusual trees and shrubs.


Pick up the FREE Newquay Tree Walk guide from Visit Newquay Tourist Information to identify some of the most notable trees and plants. Enjoy your walk around our hidden gem and make it extra special with the Newquay Tree quide.

The formal gardens were laid out in 1906 but it wasn't until 1932, during the Great Depression, that the boating lake was formed. Local unemployed men were paid dole money, tobacco and a pasty per day, and at the end of each week their wives were given a packet of tea. While work was in progress the Prince of Wales, later Edward VIII, came to Newquay and witnessed the work in progress.

Much of Trenance gardens at maintained by Newquay in Bloom, which was formed in the 1980's. It is a non-profit organisation consisting of a team of volunteers



working together in partnership with local businesses, residents and other organisations to keep Newquay looking beautiful, as well as enhancing and preserving the horticultural interest of the town.

ecently revised and reprinted the map has been updated with newly discovered information and additional artwork.

This beautifully illustrated map is both a great guide to the two enjoyable and informative walks around the town but also a great keepsake of your visit.

The map features the two walks, 'Hetty' and 'Ada' that make up the entire Discovery Trail. The 'Hetty', yellow on the map, takes a mostly coastal route including the beautiful Harbour, the 'House on the Island' and Fistral Beach. The

'Ada', pink on the map, takes in some of the coast but then moves inland passing through the Trenance Leisure Park, Gardens & Boating lake and near popular Newquay attractions including the Zoo, Waterworld and the Tennis centre.

Walking the Newquay
Discovery Trails you will find slate
discs, about a metre (1 yard)
in diameter, embedded in
the ground at key places

of interest. Each slate circle is numbered and these link in with the map with fascinating facts about your location, whilst taking in some spectacular views - a great way to enjoy a tour of Newquay without a car.







ewquay station is conveniently located in the heart of the town, making it a great starting point for scenic rail journeys across Cornwall.

Departing from Newquay, the train crosses Goss Moor and onwards through the beautiful Luxulyan Valley. Get off at Luxulyan station to explore the wooded valley and its mining heritage, or to enjoy a walk to the Eden Project (3 miles).

The Newquay branch line brings you to Par station on the Cornish main line. Change here and head west to visit St Ives, Truro or Falmouth, or east to Looe, Plymouth or on into Devon. Particular highlights include:



PLYMOUTH

Visit the city's historic waterfront. On the Hoe, admire the iconic Smeaton's Tower lighthouse and imagine Francis Drake taking in the same views of Plymouth Sound as he looked out on the Armada. Take a dip in the Tinside Lido, explore the National Marine Aquarium or take a tour of the Plymouth Gin Distillery.

LOOE VALLEY LINE

The branch line to Looe is full of beautiful views out of the train window. The wooded valley teeming with wildlife opens up to glorious estuary views as the river meets the sea. Bird watchers will love this line as, especially at low tide, the river is full of wading birds such as Little Egrets, Grey Herons, Oystercatchers and Curlews. 


COLOURFUL PARADES

Full of history is Carnival Week ending in the Newquay Grand Carnival parade. Throughout the week activities and events from music to markets are dotted around the town. The final day ends in a Carnival parade. Usually held in late June, early July it's a huge feature of the year. Fairly new to Newquay is Cornwall Pride, with stalls and music on the Killacourt and a colourful parade through the town this has quickly become a popular new favourite. Other popular parades through the town include the Zombie Crawl at Halloween and the ever popular Christmas lantern Parade ending in the official light switch on as part of the multi day event of Newquay at Christmas.

ON THE WATER

In August we have the yearly Harbour Sports day where everything comes together in a one day extravaganza of the sea followed the next day by the RNLI Lifeboat day. Here, one of the most powerful of boats - Newquay Lifeboat - will demonstrate its seagoing prowess and is usually joined by Cornwall's new rescue helicopter. The annual event of gig racing takes place down at Newquay's harbour where teams take part in the competitive rowing challenge.





A FESTIVAL OF FISH

Fishing is still a mainstay of our harbour: from the freshest catches for our local restaurants. to the fun fishing trips visitors enjoy to land their own suppers. It is no surprise then that Newquay's Fish Festival is such a key part of the event calendar. Taking over the Harbour in early September it is a mix of stalls featuring locally caught fish and shellfish, local produce, delicious cuisine and many other retailers. The highlights are the 'how to' shows by some our most famous regional chefs with the three day event concluded by the 'Last night of the Proms' featuring the live sounds of a featured silver band

DRINK AND BE MERRY

Cornwall is well known for its small breweries and has always had a long history in the production of Cider and Beers. A warm climate and the resulting sweet fruits make Cornwall an ideal brewing location for some very special 'Scrumpy' Ciders and this reflects in September's Little Orchard Cyder Festival near Newquay at Penhallow. If you also like your ales and beers then Newquay normally has the three day Newquay Beer Festival. A mix of tasting, drinking and music this event has grown and grown over the years. Now featuring over 100 beers and ciders with a range of performers it is the perfect mix. The Smugglers Inn Pie & Ale Festival in May draws the crowds with live music and a large sample of ales throughout the weekend.
